This Standard Eurobarometer 86 survey was conducted between 3 and 16 November 2016 in 34 countries and territories: the 28 Member States of the European Union, the five candidate countries (the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Turkey, Montenegro, Serbia and Albania), and the Turkish Cypriot Community in the part of the country not controlled by the government of the Republic of Cyprus. The Standard Eurobarometer survey of autumn 2016 was conducted just after the European Commission published the autumn 2016 economic forecasts. In 2016, GDP was expected to reach 1.8% in the EU and 1.7% in the euro area, which is slightly lower than the figures for 2015. In comparison, the forecasts for GDP growth are 1.6% in the United States, 0.7% in Japan, 6.6% in China and 3% globally. At the same time, there has been overall improvement in the employment situation: unemployment has continued to decline within the EU (falling from 9.1% in October 2015 to 8.3% in October

2016, a drop of 0.8 percentage points). In the euro area, it fell to under 10% for the first time since April 2011 (9.8% versus 10.6% in October 2015, -0.8).
